March is Women's History Month

The Lower Cape Fear has a rich history, of which women have been an integral part. In 1914, as women across the country were vocalizing their efforts in the campaign for voting rights, the suffrage movement organized in Wilmington. In March 1915, a Women's Suffrage League was founded.* Around the same time, Wrightsville Beach became the first city in the United States to give women the right to vote. When the city incorporated, all women who owned property were given the right to cast a ballot in town elections. *

Katherine M. Cowan became the first female mayor of Wilmington in 1924, succeeding her deceased husband. * In 1961, Hannah S. Block became the first woman to be elected to Wilmington City Council, where she served until 1963, also presiding as the first female mayor pro tempore. Vivian Wright was the first female to be elected to the New Hanover County Board of Commissioners, on which she served from 1972 to 1980.

Lower Cape Fear Chapter Signs On

A synopsis in anecdotal form of our events and experiences.

IMPACT BY THE NUMBERS

Eight events in six different venues in two counties yielded 183 persons completing voter registrations with about 73 folks taking away information. A core of volunteers worked 27 shifts and racked up 150 hours registering voters, addressing postcards, and/or organizing an event.

DID WE REGISTER AN IMPACT?

I think the first time voter project made an impact in our community. A woman showed up at the Senior Center to early vote who we registered. She even brought in her postcard from the LWV-LCF to show me she had received the One Stop Site info. That made my day!

CFCC AND WILMINGTON EARLY COLLEGE HIGH

We were given the red carpet treatment and a very busy location to set up to help register voters of all ages for the first time. We found at least one first-timer in his 50s deciding that the time was now here to take the electoral plunge. The younger set were very eager to have this opportunity, too.

POPLAR GROVE FARMER'S MARKET

Unfortunately we only had one voter change her address at Poplar Grove, but we did give people info on early voting.

CAPE FEAR COMMUNITY COLLEGE

The Fall Fest at the CFCC Main Campus in downtown Wilmington was a happy, noisy success. The challenge was talking and hearing over the music provided for this outdoor student oriented event.

STARWAY FLEA MARKET

The Starway Flea Market used to be a drive-in movie theater location. It is a bustling little hive of retail and resale activity. You can even get your hair cut there if you need to. We found vendors and customers alike who needed to update registrations or register for the first time. We heard some interesting stories from folks who were not yet citizens and from a brand new citizen, too. Many of the Hispanic or Latino people we talked to were not able to register, yet. We hope to continue to engage **new citizens** after our experience here by keeping in touch with the immigration officer who sets up oath ceremonies in our area. We want to be there to help the new citizens register on day one.

Johnette Fields and Loraine Buker organized a very successful first-time voter drive at our northernmost county high school. Jana Albritton joined as the third member of the Laney Team. We registered 60 souls during the school day. It became quite a challenge when earnest young social studies teachers brought entire classes to us. We quickly found a solution in the nearby library which had enough tables and chairs to accommodate the large numbers. Luckily, we had enough pens and registration forms to go around and the kids were very skilled at filling in the required information. The peppermints were a big hit, too.

POSTCARD PARTY

After all the registering was done, we had to address and mail out the reminder postcards. Ten of us made short work of this duty at Jana's home. Friendly political chat around the table made for a fitting end to this voter service project.
